# The CSA Quotation Guide, continued

« The Global Mean Surface Temperature is currently around 1°C warmer than the 1860 to 1990 average. Even now at 1°C, most designers and decision makers are oblivious to, or in denial about, the need to radically improve building and community development. [...]

By 2065 the IPCC<sup>1</sup> predicts that the planet will be 3°C warmer. If we are indeed to adapt to such an extreme and rapid increase in temperature we will literally only survive with strong governments and strong communities to support and protect us. [...] Designing for the 3°C future, just around the corner, will require a profound re-thinking of the way we build. »

#### « «Berlin after reunification»

In the centre of confrontation was the traditional European town: the town of compact, architecturally articulated shape and of the functional mixture of its spaces, sharply closing itself off from the surrounding countryside. This town is a rich archetype of contemporary urban existence, of which no thinking can really get rid. Too closely are tied to this town in our collective memory the emergence of a pluralistic and tolerant community and the promise of a consummate existence, even if for many citizens this promise has never been kept. [...] It has brought back remembrance and melancholy as a steady yet mute companion into the constructions of a town that fits to its time. »

### « <Analysis of living>

[...] The archetypal form of all living is not being, not in the house, but in the casing. The difference: both ways exhibit visibly the imprint of its inhabitant. The apartment in its most extreme manifestation becomes a shell. The nineteenth century has been addict to living like no other epoch. It considered the apartment as man's casing and embedded him with all his belongings deeply into its lining [...]. The twentieth century with its porosity, transparency, its open air und outdoor-being ruined living in the traditional sense. [...] Living is reduced, for the living by hotel rooms, for the dead by the crematorium. »

# 23-25 November 2009 Vienna City Hall Towards an Action Plan for Energy Efficient Housing in the UNECE Region

The United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (UNECE) in cooperation with the City of Vienna and CECODHAS (the European Liaison Committee for Social Housing) is organizing an International Forum as a discussion platform on institutional, legal, technological, financial and other policies and measures that can enhance energy efficiency in housing.

Today, buildings are responsible for a large share of total final energy demand; by and large, this energy is used in the residential sector. Demographic, economic and cultural changes will only increase the pressure of housing on energy demand and will be accompanied by even higher levels of greenhouse gas emissions. Evidence suggests, however, that it is the buildings sector and, in particular, the residential sector that could generate some of the greatest energy savings – and benefits of improved comfort, employment opportunities and fuel security of supply.


